


Physical Education

Humanities: Palm oil comes at a price...

Year 9 are certainly showing their eco credentials this week in Humanities. They have been studying how palm oil (which can be found in most supermarket products, even shampoo!) is causing widespread deforestation in the world's rainforests. This is particularly the case in Malaysia, with huge areas of rainforest chopped down for palm trees. To highlight this, they have produced some amazing posters about palm oil and how we should save the rainforest.

PALMOIL

Environmentalists argue that this burning of all palm trees is extremely bad for the planet and the environment, causing down palm oil trees causes deforestation for agriculture.

Forests are burnt down to clear land areas where people can grow oil palms - even if it's illegal.

They grow naturally in the rainforest areas but are also being planted and farmed especially to produce more palm oil.

Palm oil production is said to have been responsible for about 37% of the world's deforestation between 1990 and 2008.

Palm oil is made from the fruits of trees called 'african oil palms'. The trees originally came from west and south Africa, but were introduced to Indonesia & Malaysia in the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

Deforestation is when forests and trees are cut down to clear the land for other uses such as farming and agriculture.

Palm oil is in 50% of what you buy on a regular basis you use it to brush, shower, and make more palm oil. However, causes deforestation. Palm oil is used in pizza, toothpaste and all sorts of other things.

Save Rainforest: Save Life

80% Of Malaysian Borneo's rainforests destroyed by logging

Malaysia have lost **19200** sq/km of its forest cover

89% Of the world's palm oil is produced from Malaysia.

Deforestation have caused almost all rare specie in Malaysia to be endangered or even extinct. Animals have lost habitat due to deforestation.


Tariq and Nuur
