Dear Parents and Carers,

RE: Relationship, Sex and Health Education parent consultation

As of September 2020, a new Relationship, Sex and Health Education curriculum will be made mandatory by the Department for Education. Dean Trust Ardwick has always understood the importance of such a curriculum in safeguarding your child in a rapidly changing society, and ensuring they are equipped to develop healthy and happy relationships with those around them. RSHE prepares your child for physical, emotional and mental changes they will experience as they grow up and teaches them how to help themselves, and others

Our present curriculum is delivered through PSHE and Citizenship lessons during Term 1 as well as Personal Development sessions during form time with Form Tutors. The science curriculum also provides biological elements of Sex Education. Outside of the classroom, some topics are covered through assemblies and outside agencies providing workshops and seminars. PSHE follows the IMatter programme which has been created by Manchester Healthy Schools, a collaboration between Manchester Council and the NHS. As you can see, our current curriculum is already in line with the new government Relationship, Sex and Health Education. From September 2020, we will now be including more Health Education and will continue to be flexible in including current issues that may arise that are relevant to the pupils. We will also continue to ensure all content and delivery is age appropriate which allows all pupils to be educated and informed at the same level as their peers.

Statutory Relationship, Sex and Health Education now means that it is compulsory in all secondary schools. Parents can withdraw from Sex Education but not Relationship Education. They can request withdrawal from some or all of sex education within PSHE lessons, but not from Science lessons, and can do so up to and until three terms before the child turns 16 at which point it will be up to the child to choose whether they want full access to Sex Education.

We are now providing a period of time where, as a parent, you can ask a question about what we intend to deliver if you so wish. As the school is partially closed we have therefore provided an opportunity for parents to ask a question via email at admin@deantrustardwick.co.uk. The question must be posted within the following consultation time frame of: 3rd July 2020 to 10th July 2020. Any questions after this time will not be responded to.
